After the Inquirers and Candidates discussed chapter 22 from <u>The Franciscan Journey</u>, we opened the meeting with prayer from the Ritual Book and read ch. one of the Prologue. Mike discussed the importance of building up the Kingdom of God through our service to others.

We then prayed together a Stations of the Cross by Fr. Jack Wintz, OFM. Some commented that this was the best Stations of the Cross they had ever prayed!

We followed the example of St. Clare and contemplated upon the Crucifix. "Gaze upon Him." From ch. 15 of the FUN Manual, we are challenged by Clare to become what we love, to become the image of Jesus. Clare asked her sisters to gaze upon the face of Jesus until you can begin to see your own face there. That is the <u>start</u> of the path that leads to true imitation of Christ.

Lastly, while still gazing on our crucifixes, Dora read the prayer given by St. Francis to St. Clare entitled "The Office of the Five Wounds of Christ."

A MESSAGE FROM OUR MINISTER

Like Lazarus I was bound, in darkness, and found new life in our Lord Jesus Christ. Throughout our Lenten journey we are shown so many instances of our personal darkness and collective sins against one another.

Easter brings us the Resurrection and new life. We are called to bring the Light of Christ into the darkness. Like Lazarus, we have been called to new life.

Are we living this new life to build His Kingdom? How are we accomplishing this?

At the Vocations conference last month at St. Mary's Seminary, Daniel Cardinal DiNardo included in his homily how we, as the Church, must foster vocations. He challenged us to not only pray twice a week for vocations but to also let our children, grandchildren, nieces and nephews know when they are considering the path their life will take, that the priesthood or religious life is a viable option. There were a total of 5 couples who spoke on the vocations that came out of their homes. A commonality was they all prayed together and had family time together. With the pace of today's society that is a true challenge for us. As we strive in our respective parishes to foster vocations we are also strengthened by our brothers and sisters in our fraternity.

To be a Secular Franciscan is a vocation. We have been called and have responded, or will soon, to profess for life. We are to witness within our respective lives and workplaces to the Gospel.

Our Rule 17 addresses what we as Franciscans must do. It includes: "In their family they should cultivate the Franciscan spirit of peace, fidelity, and respect for life....by living the grace of matrimony, husbands and wives should joyfully accompany their children on the journey by providing a simple and open Christian education and being attentive to the vocation of each child.

It is so incredible that David remembers his mother going to Secular Franciscan meetings, and to hear Rachel speak of the Poor Clare's when she was growing up and the works her parents did for the marginalized in their community.

Once again all of our Texas Bishops were present, and the Cardinal opened up the rally on the steps of the Capitol. Not only did Father Mike use his one day off to accompany us on this bus trip, he started off our trip with a prayer, led a rosary in the rotunda, and was joyful in spite of the heat and lots and lots of walking in a building and grounds barely ADA accessible.
