As well, we are encouraged to bring toys and food or monetary donations to assist the St. Vincent de Paul Society here at St. Jerome’s. Delores reported that during the Christmas season, approximately 900 kids are given gifts and 300 families receive food.

We then watched a DVD from the “Q” on Laudate Si. The speaker was Brother Keith, OFM. Laudate Si is a vision of Franciscan Spirituality. He spoke of the relatedness of nature, God and humanity. We can have a direct experience of God in nature. Our care for the earth is directly related to our care for the poor. We are called to be a people of joy, self-giving and open-heartedness. Love of Beauty is a spiritual practice; Beauty is a pathway to God. We are called to an ecological conversion, encompassing love, gratitude, worship, praise, appreciation of beauty.

A statement from the 1972 Stockholm Environmental Conference, “Only One Earth”, says it perfectly: “We have forgotten how to be good guests, how to walk lightly on the earth as its other creatures do.”

Last week I had the opportunity to participate and represent our fraternity at the Regional meeting in Baton Rouge at the convent of the Franciscan nuns. It is always a blessing to meet with our Franciscan family from throughout the Region.

The St. Joan of Arc Region has fraternities in 4 states, and it has been a busy year with elections and visitations. 9 elections have been completed, and 3 visitations. Since there must be a Pastoral and Fraternal Representative at all elections and visitations, a special thanks goes to Brother Juniper, as he was the Pastoral representative at all of them! Thank you, Brother Juniper!

Our Regional Formation Director, Cynthia Duet, OFS, provided our on-going formation, beginning with Rule 19. We all need to strive to bring joy and hope to all. We need to come together and support one another. A common issue faced by many, if not all fraternities, are people who do not regularly participate in the life of the fraternity. Some profess and drift off, others do not take their profession promise seriously and as a result our meetings do not take precedence over other activities.

Brother Juniper stressed the importance of flexibility in Formation. He compared us all to a prism. It is one thing, yet comprised of multiple colors of light. Our Regional Minister, Cherryle, discussed her recent trip representing our Region to the National Chapter Meeting. Our National Chapter has been so supportive of those in our Region who have had multiple tragedies this year including the ambush of police officers and the Louisiana flooding. They told the assembly how one of our fraternities (St. Joseph in Baton Rouge) had responded to a request from International to assist with a situation in Africa, and how their generosity has been returned 20 fold. At last count over \$20,000 dollars has been contributed from our brothers and sisters throughout the country and world to support those in SW Louisiana.

Our Region is also exploring the possibility of hosting a National Chapter in a couple of years. There are only two cities that have the airport facilities needed, New Orleans and Houston as. Our former Regional Minister Pat Houghton is looking at possible retreat houses, etc..
