Alba spoke to us about her involvement in the Human Trafficking training program led by the Archdiocese. The training was to train others to become presenters.

Fr. Mike will be leading a dialogue via Facebook beginning Sept. 1 through Oct. 4 on the Season of Creation. Delores gave us an update on our St. Vincent de Paul apostolate—each day a hygiene kit is being given to 40 families, plus back-to-school supplies.

Plans are being made for those who are able to attend the 7th Fiesta Franciscana in San Antonio on Saturday, October 14. The presentation will take place at the Franciscan Mission of San Jose & Miguel with Fr. _____ presenting. So far, 7 of us have made arrangements to attend. There's still time if anyone wants to join in.

We prayed Day 1 of a Novena to St. Maximilian Kolbe which will conclude on his feast day of August 14.

Afterwards, Dora gave a presentation on the Nature of the Secular Franciscan Order from our FUN Manual, chapter 9. She also spoke of being in a penitential order and what that entails. When we pick up our crosses and curb our desires for the love of God, we are sharing in His work of salvation. We deny ourselves only in order to find Him. And this principle way of denying ourselves is by humility. "God resists the proud and gives grace to the humble." Take hope: our suffering bears great fruit. It satisfies for our own sins, it purifies the soul, it deepens and strengthens our character and personality. It gives us an insight and sympathy for our neighbor that can be acquired in no other way. As we discussed, in after-sight, most sufferings turn out to be a blessing in disguise!

Humility does not consist mainly in **being small** - one can be small without being humble; nor does it consist principally in **feeling small**, because one can feel small when one actually is small, and that would be an objective statement, but not yet humility. To say nothing of the fact that feeling small and insignificant could stem from an inferiority complex and lead one to withdraw into oneself and to despair, rather than to humility. Therefore humility per se, in the most perfect degree, lies not in being small, nor in feeling small or proclaiming oneself small. It lies in **making** oneself small, not out of some necessity or personal advantage, but out of love in order to "raise up" others.

Thus was Jesus' humility; He made himself so small, in fact, that he "emptied" himself for us.

Saint Francis made "Sister Water" the symbol of humility, describing it as "useful, humble, precious and chaste." Water, in fact, never "elevates" itself, never "ascends," but always "descends" until it has found the lowest point. Steam rises, and that is why it is the traditional symbol of pride and vanity; water descends and is, therefore, the symbol of humility.
